riday March 13, 2020, will be a date forever etched in our memory. We planned to send Sophie D., one of our reporters, on-site to the ISU World Figure Skating Championships in Montreal the following week. Australia had four athletes scheduled to compete. Two singles veterans, and a brand-new dance team in their first season of international competition, and **aussieSKATES** intended to cover their participation for the page. Our budding excitement in the days leading up to departure, however, was quickly replaced with concern. International headlines began to be dominated by the discovery of a new and mysterious virus. With no preventative medicines or cure, it was highly infectious, potentially deadly, and spreading like wildfire around the globe.

Since the world was coming to Canada, there was talk that the event might be postponed, closed to the paying public, or even cancelled. A decision of that magnitude hadn't been considered since 1961. Almost sixty years before, the World Championships in Prague were called off out of respect to Team U.S.A lost in an air crash en-route to Czechoslovakia.

To cut a long story short, soon, the planet came to a complete stop. Australia, and in particular, our home base of Melbourne, didn't see much skating activity for the next twelve months. Caught up in the most isolating circumstances from experience, many athletes had to find creative ways to maintain their fitness and motivation.

When international competition eventually resumed, all focus was on the 2021 Nebelhorn Trophy. This Challlenger Series event in Obersdorf, Germany, was designated the official qualification event for the Olympic Winter Games in Beijing. Competition for berths across the board was fierce, and Australia earned spots in Men's and Women's Singles.

Meanwhile, a brand-new local pairing made a splash on the Junior Grand Prix Circuit. Right out of the gate, Anastasia Golubeva and Hektor Giotopoulos-Moore radiated star quality in spades. The young team ended the season with a silver medal at the 2022 ISU World Junior Championships. Their victory was a heart-warming finish to what has surely been a difficult two years.

aussieSKATES would like to thank Sophie D. for her generosity in covering the 2022 World Championships in Montpellier, France, and especially Robin Ritoss in supplying stunning images of Team Australia and Team New Zealand competing last season.

Scrief EVENT REVIEW

2022 isu world figure skating championships montpellier, france

In March, **aussieSKATES** sent Sophie D. to the World Figure Skating Championships as our online media representative. This official accreditation allowed her to see the event live from the reporters' stand in the Sud de France Arena, as well as backstage access granted to the mixed zone, and post-competition analysis with the top three in each discipline. Please enjoy Sophie's in-depth interviews with athletes from Team Australia, Team New Zealand, Great Britain and Switzerland.



SCALE EVENT OVERVIEW

welcome to montpellier

For the first time, Montpellier is hosting the World Figure Skating Championships.

This city is in southern France near the Mediterranean Sea. One of the largest urban centres in the region of Occitania, Montpellier is the prefecture of the department of Hérault. In 2017, 285,121 people lived in the city, while its urban area had a population of 616,296. The inhabitants are called Montpelliérains.

In the Middle Ages, Montpellier was an important city of the Crown of Aragon (and was the birthplace of James I), and then of Majorca, before its sale to France in 1349. Established in 1220, the University of Montpellier is one of the oldest universities in the world and oldest medical school still in operation, with notable alumni such as Petrarch, Nostradamus and François Rabelais. Above the medieval city, the ancient citadel of Montpellier is a stronghold built in the seventeenth century by Louis XIII of France.

Since the 1990s, Montpellier has experienced one of the strongest economic and demographic growth in the country. Its urban area has experienced the highest population growth in France since the year 2000. Numbering 70,000, students comprise nearly one-fourth of its population, one of the highest such proportions in Europe. Its living environment with one of Europe's largest pedestrian area, along with its rich cultural life and Mediterranean climate, explain the enthusiasm for the city, which is nicknamed the "Gifted".

Montpellier is famous for its "Place de la Comédie" and Antigone areas with lots of fancy restaurants, shops and a busy night life.

The competition will take place at the "Sud de France Arena", located into the Parc des Expositions, 6 km from the city center.

Sud de France Arena (also known as the Arena Montpellier) is an indoor arena located in the Montpellier suburb of Pérols, in the south of France that opened in September 2010. It has a seating capacity of 14,000 spectators, with 10,000 for sporting events.

Inaugurated on September 3, 2010, the hall fulfills both the functions of a performance hall, an omnisports hall and an exhibition and congress hall with a capacity of:

- 14,800 spectators, in show configuration
- 10,700 spectators in sports configuration

competition fast facts

- The 2022 World Ice Dance Champions from France, Gabriella Papadakis & Guillame Cizeron, earned ISU World Record Scores in the Rhythm Dance (with 92.73 points), the Free Dance (with 137.09 points), and overall (229.82 points)
- With Shoma Uno earning gold and Yuma Kagiyama taking silver, Japan placed at least one man on the podium for an eighth consecutive World Championships. Uno's title is the country's first in men's singles since 2017.
- Kaori Sakamoto of Japan won the country's first medal since 2018 and the first title since Mao Asada in 2014. Silver medalist Loena Hendrickx of Belgium won the country's first ISU Championships medal in women's singles, while bronze medalist Alysa Liu of the United States won the country's first medal since Ashley Wagner in 2016. It was the first podium featuring skaters representing three different countries since 2014.
- Alexa Knierim & Brandon Frazier of the United States won the country's first pairs medal since Kyoko Ina & John Zimmerman earned bronze in 2002. It was also the first World title for the country since Tai Babilonia & Randy Gardner won in 1979. Japan's Riku Miura & Ryuichi Kihara earned the highest-ever placement for a Japanese pair with their silver medal finish.

your backstage pass

One of the exciting perks of earning official accreditation at an ISU championship figure skating event, is being able to interview the athletes face to face.

Having previously covered World Championships in Moscow, Saitama, Beijing, Boston, and Helsinki, each of these competitions had a space called the mixed zone.

Away from public view, this is a backstage area adjascent to the arena, specifically set aside for reporters and other members of the media to catch up with the skaters immediately after they have competed.

Standard questions that are asked include:

- What the athletes thought of their performances at the event, and whether they were satisifed with the outcome
- Was there anything they could have done differently or better
- What was their training regimen leading up to the competition, and did they have any challenges along the way
- What were their plans after competition or perhaps, moving forward
- What thought process went into choosing music and costumes.

During her week in Montpellier, our reporter on-site, Sophie D, caught up with:

- Kailani Craine / Team Australia International Senior Women's Singles
- Holly Harris & Jason Chan / Team Australia International Senior Ice Dance
- Charlotte Lafond-Fournier & Richard Kang In Kam / Team New Zealand International Senior Ice Dance
- Zoe Jones & Christopher Boyadji / Team Great Britain International Senior Pairs
- Stéphane Lambiel / Switzerland Switzerland's World Men's Singles Skating Champion (2005 & 2006) and Elite Skating Coach whose students include Men's Singles skaters, Shoma Uno (Japan) and Deniss Vasiljevs (Latvia) and Women's Singles skaters, Alexa Paganini (Switzerland). All three athletes competed in Montpellier.

kailani craine

Day One - Wednesday March 23, 2022 **Women's Singles Short Program**

Kailani Craine qualified for the free skate, thanks to a convincing short program. She was delighted to know that the interview was for aussieSKATES.

Q. Your programs are so different from anything the other women are currently presenting.

You have always played a major part in choosing your music and costumes, what prompted you to take such an avantgarde path this year with your short and free skates?

A: For me it is inconceivable not to get involved in both the musical choice and the costume because the programs reflect who I am.

For this short program, it's funny. Indeed, there is more than one year, I heard and immediately liked this melody ("Heart of Glass") without even knowing the interpreter - Blondie.

I tried for a long time to find it... in vain.

Then one day, Alex (Chan) sends me music asking me what I thought... and it was just that song. Incredible! It was really meant to be!

For the free, it is a music that corresponds more to my "dark side" (bursts of laughter).

Today, I was not too nervous during the six minute warm-up. I was very touched by the warm welcome from the French public, and it touches me especially since it is important for me to represent my country as at the Olympic Games.

The public means a lot to me, it is mainly for them that I skate: I love galas, communicating, exchanging with the spectators, transmitting to them my 'joie de vivre' and my love of skating.

Day One - Wednesday March 23, 2022 **Pairs' Short Program**

Zoe Jones is a former women's singles skater for Great Britain. She retired in 2002, only to return to eligible individual competition in 2015 before eventually joining forces with Christopher Boyadji.

Sophie asked Zoe lones the following question.

- Q. What are your impressions after your short program and how do you find skating again at this level?
- A. "After skating in singles, I took a break consisting of giving birth to three children (twin girls aged fourteen who skate in novice, and a nine year old boy who practices ice hockey) and then I returned to competition".

While Christopher admits he was very nervous, Zoe on the contrary was guite relaxed.

"Since it's our last competition, there's no reason to be nervous but, on the contrary, it's better to enjoy".

Today, aged 42, she participates in her last World Championships while admitting without skating I am a little lost!"

Day Three -Friday March 25, 2022 **Rhythm Dance**

For their Rhythm Dance, Australia's Holly Harris & lason Chan skated a medley of Kylie Minoque's hits.

At the end of the routine. the dancers were satisfied with their performance, and their happiness to skate and to be present at Worlds was obvious.



Sophie asked Holly Harris the following question.

- Q. What has been the biggest transition from competing in women's singles to ice dance?
- A. "It's really very different mentally but it was easy. The advantage lies in the fact that, in training as in competition, you have a person with whom you can talk, exchange."

(Standing in the mixed zone, Holly was radiant with joy.)

Sophie then asked Jason Chan this question.

- Q. With so many I.AM (Ice Academy Montreal) teams competing here in France, how inspiring is it to train at one of the most populated ice dancing academies in the world?
- A. "Training there is fantastic! It's motivating and inspiring. We have evolved a lot, progressed since the Nebelhorn Trophy. We have gained in complementarity."

Day Three - Friday March 25, 2022 **Rhythm Dance**

Following her interview with Holly Harris & Jason Chan, Sophie asked their training mates, Charlotte Lafond-Fournier and Richard Kang In Kam, the same guestion.

- Q. With so many I.AM teams competing here in France, how inspiring is it to train at one of the most populated ice dancing academies in the world?
- Charlotte: "We are satisfied with our performance." Α.
- A. Richard: "It is undeniably the best Ice Dance school in the world right now. Not only do all the staff make sure to provide us with everything we need to train, but it is also a chance, a great opportunity for us to be able to work daily among the best dancers today."

Charlotte is Canadian and is waiting to obtain New Zealand citizenship.

Richard was born and raised in New Zealand, and he is looking forward to this opportunity for him to represent his country.

On the Canadian climate:

A. "You never get completely used to the Canadian cold (bursts of laughter).

> However, since we spend a lot of time on the ice, we end up getting used to it!"

Sparkling and determined, Australia's Kailani Craine presented a good free program, on a remix of the music of "Gangsta's Paradise". Radiant at the exit of the Kiss & Cry, she is always available and enthusiastic to answer questions asked in the mixed zone.

"I am very happy with my performance today, despite some small imperfections that will be easy to correct. The atmosphere in the rink and the incredible support of the public both carried and delighted me. What a joy to skate here today!"

With stars in her eyes and a broad smile that shines through despite wearing a mask, she adds: "Now is the time to take a little rest and look to the future; but above all, I'm going to visit Paris tomorrow."

We won't know any more, but the public is already looking forward to seeing her again and discovering new innovative programs.

stéphane lambiel

Stéphane Lambiel is Switzerland's World Men's Singles Champion (2005 & 2006) and an Elite Skating Coach whose students include Men's Singles skaters, Shoma Uno (Japan) and Deniss Vasiljevs (Latvia) and Women's Singles skaters, Alexa Paganini (Switzerland). All three athletes competed in Montpellier.

Passionate and enthusiastic, but always deliciously posed and humble, he agreed to share his concepts and practices of coaching with **aussieSKATES**.

"When I was still skating in competition, I completely ruled out the possibility of one day becoming a coach because it's a crazy job! Then after I stopped competing, I started giving lectures and internships and I took a liking to it!

That being said, I confirm that it's a crazy job! Having students of different nationalities, and therefore sometimes very different cultures, requires openmindedness and adaptability.

For example, I remember my first trip to Japan while skating in the junior category. Totally flabbergasted, and with the impression of being on another planet, I discovered a great and beautiful culture. Sometimes also very surprising in which, for example, we do not allow physical contact; we do not hug each other. However, born of a Swiss father and a Portuguese mother, I come from a Latin culture in which touch is very important.

For each of my students, I wonder what I will be able to do for him. In my opinion, it is essential to transmit with pedagogy. During this process, I realized that I learn a lot about others and about myself. It is a permanent personal and human learning. It is a permanent pleasure to work on movements, fluidity, attitudes, according to the morphology of each of the athletes and in accordance with the music.

I have an incredibly extensive playlist for each of my students. I propose different music, but I never impose anything. This is very important because, when an athlete has to skate a year on a music, he has the right to have chosen it. Therefore to love it, and thus, he has the opportunity to fully express himself.

For me, the inner frustration begins the very moment the music in my student's program begins. Because at that moment, I can no longer do anything for him. This feeling is very different from the one I felt in competition because there, I knew that it was the moment when I could do everything. In my opinion, skating is in danger, because it should not be reduced to performing quadruple rotations. Remember, Brian Boitano was already doing quadruple jumps in the 80s. What is new, and unfortunate, is that we completely forget the creative and artistic aspects by focusing only on the number of quadruple jumps in terms of the points they earn.

Regarding the technical equipment, it is clear that the new types of skates (lighter) can advantage the average skaters a little but not those who are excellent."

Always amiable and professional, Stéphane is unanimous among his entourage, Japanese in particular. Transmission, pedagogy, and respect make him a being of a humanity.

Thus, the assembly received a strong tribute to him and a full minute of standing ovation. The Ukrainian skaters did not hide their emotion, wiping away a few tears.

At the end of the pairs' short program during where they qualified for the pairs' free skate, the Ukrainian couple unfortunately withdrew "for personal reasons".

For his part, and in the Men's category, Ivan Shmuratko qualified for the men's singles free skate at the end of a rather solid program. Despite a fall on the triple lutz-triple loop combination, he landed a very solid triple axel and very beautiful pirouettes where artistic impression allowed him to earn additional points.

In the Kiss & Cry while waiting for his scores, Shmuratko was joined by the Ukrainian dance couple. He also received a standing ovation from the audience present, many whom had brought in the flags of Ukraine.

Deprived of team competition at the recent Olympic Games in Beijing due to COVID, he chose to skate on his short program of the previous season: "a life of love" by Charles Aznavour... a very appropriate message.







Great poise. Great presence on the ice. This young woman, Anastasia, commands you to look at this team. Hektor's strong and powerful. Secure.


They skate strong. They skate fast. Very, very nice team indeed.


